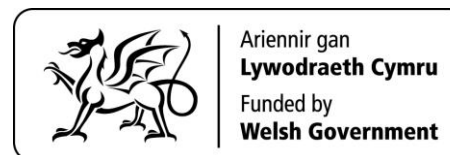

	<p><b>Parallel Workshop 2: Adaptive designs making clinical trials more flexible and efficient:</b>  <b>Lead:</b> Dr Philip Pallmann &amp; Dr Thomas Jaki, Adaptive Designs Working Group, MRC Hub  <b>Synopsis:</b> Adaptive designs can make clinical trials very flexible as they allow for design changes while the trial is under way. In addition to some classical methods like early stopping or sample-size recalculation, a wealth of modern, efficient, and ethically favorable designs have been developed in recent years. In our seminar we give a non-technical overview of available adaptive methods and present examples of their use in real clinical trials.
