Parallel sessions: Workshops & posters

Workshop 1: *Novel Participatory Methods in Qualitative Research*

Delivered by: Fiona Wood, Harriet Quinn-Scoggins, Amber Jordan, Denitza Williams, Becki Law

In this workshop we will discuss a number of novel participatory methods that have been used by PRIME researchers. These include 'time-lines', 'life-grids', 'draw, write and tell' and 'serious Lego play'. We will explore how these methods have been used, to what effect, and how the data might be analysed. Workshop participants will get an opportunity to work with a partner using one of the methods.

Workshop 2: *No research about us without us': how public and patient involvement is essential in PRIME research*

The aim of this workshop is to summarise public and patient involvement (PPI) resources available to research teams linked to PRIME and discuss how to access and use them. Workshop attendees will learn about: Potential benefits of PPI in your research; Importance of PPI in winning research funding and undertaking your research; How SUPER works to benefit PRIME; Examples and tools to strengthen PPI in your research proposal.

Workshop 3: *Methods for reviewing large bodies of evidence*

This will include a presentation of the methods for reviewing large bodies of evidence using a recent review of prognostic factors for lung cancer survival as an exemplar. Participants will then have the opportunity, working in small groups, to think about which methods they would use for reviewing the evidence for a series of scenarios. We will then discuss these as a group.

Workshop 4: *Global collaboration for primary care research*

We aim to discuss the barriers and benefits of developing research in rural and remote communities globally addressing local research needs. We hope to use the experiences of workshop participants to build a consensus to plan a way for future collaborations and capacity building especially in low and middle income countries.
